## ECOLOGY AND POLITICAL STRUCTURE OF MODULAR CITIES ALONG THE MEDIEVAL SILK ROAD Michael Frachetti (Washington University, St. Louis)

This paper will present the discovery of a new Silk Road city in Uzbekistan, called Tashbulak. Tashbulak dates to the period of the Qarakhanid Empire, a nomadic state that ruled over vast territories of Central Asia from the 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> c. CE. Of key concern is the nature of urbanism amongst "nomadic" polities: How did they use cities and how did their cities serve to shape the networks of trade and exchange that define the Silk Roads throughout the medieval era?
