Quantitative approaches to understand the importance of cattle in neolithic societies

Animal bones are one of the most frequent archaeological finds in excavations. Both wild and domestic animals were important ressources in prehistoric societies, not only for nutrition, but also traction and raw materials like hides, bone and antler were important. Nevertheless, quantifying the importance of animals in comparison to plant ressources is not a simple task. In my presentation I will discuss methods to quantify the importance of cattle in neolithic societies with exemplary case studies from Swiss and German wetland sites. Due to the high resolution dating possibilities in those sites, diachronic developments of cattle breeding techniques, diversification and specialisation can be oberved. The importance of cattle within different agricultural systems and their impact on landscape changes will also briefly be mentioned.
